Since the start of the pandemic in March 2020, the Ellington Board of Education and staff took a common sense approach thereby strengthening the collective trust of our family. In the winter of 2021 I wrote to you a message entitled, <u>In like a Lion, Out Like a Lamb</u>. The message may be summarized with the following quote:

The Ellington Family is highly imperfect—at times, messy—but that, as humans, is what makes us so perfect. Our family celebrates progress valuing the perspective and experiences of all, even when we are uncomfortable and might not fully understand. The Ellington Family honors free will, recognizing that an individual's free will shall not infringe upon the rights of others. Progress at the expense of one over another isn't progress at all.

Ellington's common sense approach is predicated by honoring the voices of all. Do you remember the <u>August 2021 Board of Education meeting</u>? The opening of a transparent window of opportunity, supported by the <u>Seeds of Civility</u>, for each other to understand, consider, and partner with trust is the foundation of our approach. It was a moment in time for common sense—despite the fear—for members of the Ellington Family to exercise their free will while honoring their neighbors.
